Second Class Scout Rank - Revision Worksheet

Remember all the skills you learned to earn the Scout & Tenderfoot Ranks

- Demonstrate how a compass works & how to orient a map. Explain map symbol meaning
- Using a compass & map together take a 5-mile hike approved by an adult leader & parent
- Since joining, have participated in five separate troop/patrol activities.
- On a troop/patrol campout:
 - Select your patrol site and sleep in a tent that you pitched
 - Demonstrate proper care, sharpening & use of a knife, saw & axe
 - Describe when a knife, saw & axe should be used
 - Use a knife, saw or axe to prepare tinder, kindling, and fuel for a cooking fire
 - Explain use of a cooking fire Vs. a lightweight stove & explain the safety procedures
 - Demonstrate how to light an open fire & a lightweight stove
 - Plan & cook over an open fire a meal for yourself, with foods from the food pyramid
 - Explain good nutrition. Explain how to transport, store, & prepare foods you selected
- Participate in a flag ceremony for an organization - usually for a Troop meeting
- Participate in a service project (minimum of one hour) approved by your Scoutmaster
- Identify (show evidence) of at 10+ kinds of wild animals found in your community.
- Explain "hurry" case actions for stopped breathing, serious bleeding, & internal poisoning
- Prepare/show a personal first aid kit to take with you on a hike
- Explain/Demonstrate first aid for the following:
 - Object in the eye
 - Bite of a suspected rabid animal
 - Puncture wounds from a splinter, nail, and fishhook
 - Serious burns (second degree)
 - Heat exhaustion
 - Shock
 - Heatstroke, dehydration, hypothermia, and hyperventilation
- Explain the precautions to take for a safe swim trip
- Demonstrate jumping feet first into water over your head in depth, level off and swim 25 feet on the surface, stop, turn sharply, resume swimming, then return
- Demonstrate water rescue methods by reaching with your arm or leg, by reaching with a suitable object, and by throwing lines and objects
- Explain why swimming rescues shouldn't be attempted when a reaching/throwing rescue is possible & explain why and how a rescue swimmer should avoid contact with a victim.
- Participate in a school, community, or troop program on the dangers of using drugs, alcohol, tobacco & other practices that could be harmful to your health. Discuss participation in the program with your family
- Demonstrate Scout spirit by living the Scout Oath & Scout Law in your everyday life
- Complete a Scoutmaster conference.
- Complete your board of review
